2011 NCAA MEN'S LACROSSE CHAMPIONSHIPS

2011 NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship
Virginia (13-5) 9 - Maryland (13-5) 7
M&T Bank Stadium | Baltimore, Md. | May 30, 2011 | 3:30 p.m.

- Virginia is now 5-4 in NCAA Tournament championship games.
- The title is the fourth at Virginia for Cavalier head coach **Dom Starsia**. The Cavaliers won the title for Starsia in 1999, 2003, and 2006.
- The first quarter was the lowest scoring first quarter in NCAA Division I Championship game history. The previous record was two held by three different championship games (1986 – Virginia 1, UNC 1; 1976 – Maryland 1, Cornell 1; 1973 – Johns Hopkins 2, Maryland 0).
- The last time a team was held scoreless in the first quarter of an NCAA Championship game was 2003 when Virginia led Johns Hopkins 4-0. Virginia went on to win the game 9-7.
- The last time Virginia was held scoreless in the first quarter was in the March 26 loss at Johns Hopkins.
- The Cavaliers scored just one first period goal in the April 2 loss at Maryland as they trailed 2-1 after the first 15 minutes of play.
- **Colin Briggs'** second period goal snapped a game-opening scoreless streak of 17:13 for the Cavaliers.
- Briggs has now scored at least one goal in his last three games. He has found the back of the net in 12 of his last 13 games including five multiple goal efforts.
- Briggs' second goal of the game gave him his seventh multi-goal games in 2011. His third goal with 1:59 left in the second gave him his fifth hat trick of the season. Briggs' fourth goal of the game (12:18 in the third) tied his career-high set at Duke on April 16. His fifth goal with 1:50 remaining in the game established a new career-high.
- Briggs now has 12 points on 11 goals and one assist in his eight career NCAA Tournament games.
- The Cavaliers have been offensively prolific in the second quarter. For the season, Virginia has outscored their opponents 67-33 in the second period including 5-2 in Monday's championship game.
- In their four NCAA Tournament games, Virginia has outscored their opponents 21-4 in the second quarter.
- The Cavaliers have outscored their opponents by 53 goals with the 34-goal difference in the second quarter accounting for 64.1% of their season surplus.
- The Cavaliers went on a 4-0 run as they held the Terps scoreless for 15:46 (7:44 in the second through 6:58 in the third).
- **Matt White's** fourth quarter goal with 10:03 left in regulation snapped a 17:15 scoreless streak for the Cavaliers. **Nick O'Reilly** assisted on White's goal and was his third helper of the game and fourth point on the day.
- White's second fourth quarter goal gave him his third hat trick of the year. He extended his consecutive goal-scoring streak to six games as he has recorded 12 goals and 3 assists in that six-game stretch. The goal was also his second game-winning goal of the year.
- The Cavaliers' **Chris Bocket** had his 35-game goal-scoring streak snapped. That streak was the longest active streak in the nation entering the championship game.
- Virginia entered the game first in the nation in EMO (53.1%) but was just 0-for-1 in man advantage situations in the game.
- The nine goals is just the second time this season Virginia has been held under double digits. The first time in 2011 also came against Maryland as the Terps won 12-7 in the April 2 regular season meeting.
- The Atlantic Coast Conference has now won 12 NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse championships, the most of any conference in the country. The Ivy League is second with nine titles.

Post-Game Notes: Virginia vs. Maryland

- Virginia goalkeeper **Adam Ghitelman** earned his 50th career win with the victory on Monday. He is currently ranked third all time in Division I goalkeeping victories. The senior finished his career 50-11 as he is ranked 19th in saves per game and 36th in the country in goals against average in 2011.
- During Virginia's five game season-ending win streak, the Cavaliers have outscored their opponents 60-38.
- For the first time in their last seven NCAA Tournament games, Bocklet did not lead the Cavaliers in scoring in the game. Bocklet either led or tied for the lead in scoring in the Cavaliers' last six tournament games. Briggs led the Cavaliers in Monday's championship game with his career-high five goals.
- Virginia has now won 10 of their last 12 meetings with the Terps while they are now 7-4 against Maryland in neutral site games.
